# Being Godly for Dummies by Rabbi Dani Locker




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- 66Hey Aaron!"
  - Yes, my holy brother Moshe, what can I do for uou?"
- 1'm on a deadline, and I need help! You see it's time for a new Torah portion, and I don't have anything to write. What am I supposed to put in the Torah for this week?"
- Easy. Just do the ten commandments again. That episode was a huge hit! The angels gave it 2 enthusiastic wings up!"
- No. I can't do a rerun. How can I keep my ratings up if I don't have original content?"
- 66 Hey, don't sweat it little bro. Just take the ten commandments, reword them, make them sound a little different, and all will be copacetic."
- ADIES AND GENTLEMEN, the above is NOT how Parshat Kedoshim came to be. Let's just be clear about that for a moment.

Tf you take a look at the beginning of this week's Torah bortion, you'll find a remarkable resemblance to the ten commandments. Take a look at the graphic on the next page where we've lined up each of

the commandments with its Kedoshim counterpart, and it could pass as a stunt double. But since we've safely established that Kedoshim is not a cleverly disguised rerun, we should probably try to understand WHY the Torah would repeat these rules, with their differences.



Take a look at each. Really, take a moment, stop reading this, look at that graphic and find the differences.

Ok. You back yet? What do you see? I'll tell you what I see. In the ten commandments, I see generalities. I see big grand rules of life. In Kedoshim, I see strategies and ideas of HOW to successfully achieve them. They are the

everyday actions that will help us become Godly. Let me give you a few examples:

Don't murder. Well, most people don't start out their lives planning on murder. The mitzvah in Kedoshim is to not stand by while someone is being hurt. Training ourselves in that sensitivity to others will result in an increased appreciation for life and for people.

Don't bear false witness. The Kedoshim version is not to be a gossiping storyteller. Don't talk about

people, and you'll avoid hurting people with your words.

Finally, the last mitzvah in the top 10 is not to be jealous. How do we achieve that? V'ahavta L'rayacha Kamocha. Love your friend like you love yourself. Really think deeply about how special other people are. Train yourself to love them, and you'll be thrilled with what they have, rather than wanting it for yourself.

In a way, Parshat Kedoshim is Godly living for Dummies. Follow these rules, and you'll find yourself living life in the best possible way.

Dear Etern, Eli,

Your question is extremely normal. It's been asked over and over throughout history, by every person who has suffered a loss. Even though the question is coming from a place of pain and confusion, it's still a really powerful and thoughtful question. You're right that God does have the power to keep us alive forever, and the fact is that He did not set up the world that way. So, why not? Why is death built in to our existence here in the world.

Today I will give you just one answer, although there's a lot we can discuss. Please feel free to contact me this week if you'd like to discuss it more thoroughly.

Tom Bullet had his offense set. As the quarterback, Tom had brought his team, in an incredibly challenging year, to this

moment. It was week 16, the last game of the season, and now, with the game tied late in the 4th quarter, he had the chance to send his team to the playoffs. Just a few seconds ago, during a huddle, Tom had given his teammates the most emotional speech of his career. He had spoken about their dreams, and about how it was all on the line. If they played their hardest for the

next few minutes, they could make history.

Now Tom was about to start the play, when the coach called time out. The team hurried to the sidelines, where the coach gave his team the

All sports leagues have ends to seasons (even the seemingly eternal baseball season ends eventually). If life went on forever, people would not feel that life was meaningful, and people certainly wouldn't feel the pressure or focus of making every moment count.

Endings make experiences meaningful.

There's a talmudic phrase (Avos) that says, "Return to God one day before you die." The understood meaning is that since we don't know when that will be, we've got to

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live each day as focused as if it was our last. This is perhaps one reason why God made life on this world short and gave it an end. So that we can make the most of the time we have.
