I See the Door!

Did you know you can ask your Jewish questions directly via email, text or instagram? Below is an actual screenshot of a question I received this week. What would you say?

weird question:

I'm at a hotel, and I don't want room service touching my Siddur. Is it okay if I take out the bible they keep in the room out of the drawer and replace it with my siddur ?? or is that disrespectful for the siddur Brayden a Christian bible used to be in there?

Come explanation:

he asker knows hot to treat a holy book! One of the first lessons I learned in first grade, or maybe before, was to treat a prayerbook or Torah book differently

than a regular book. It makes sense. If you win a toy ring at Chuckee Cheese, you can do whatever you want with it. You can use it to scratch your nose, or hold open a door, or throw at random people when they're

not looking (Just. Kidding. Don't. Do. That.). If you have a piece of jewelry that is an important family heirloom, passed down for generations, or that is Worth a ton of money, you've gotta treat it better. Keep it polished, and in a respectful, clean spot. And you take it off before you plunge a toilet.

here is nothing more important to us than the Torah, and our relationship with God. Any book or writing that has God's name or a quote from the Torah is handled like priceless jewelry. Here's what we do:

holy book goes on top. If there's a stack of books, your ordinary books go on the bottom, and your siddur goes on top of them (holier books also go on continued on back



continued from front

top of less

you can ask your personal Rabbi if you have a specific question).

We don't bring holy books into an unclean place like a bathroom, or any home teenage boys live. Maybe slight exaggeration there, but seriously, no bathroom visits with a copy of the talmud.

We don't throw a holy book away when we're done with it. If a book is old and ruined and can no longer be used, it's buried respectfully in a Jewish cemetery.

We try to make sure a holy book is placed up-side-up (is that the opposite of upside down?) and on a table or shelf-not the floor. We're also careful not to sit on the same chair or bench as a Chumash or other holy publication. If a holy book does fall on the floor, may have the custom to kiss it as a show of love and respect. Some have the custom to leave it on the floor and tweet about it, but I'm pretty sure that's a bad custom.

In the hotel question, the siddur is being placed in a drawer for its own safety. That's an act of respect. The fact that that drawer sometimes plays host to a different type of book doesn't give the drawer cooties or anything. It's still just a drawer. Except now it's an extra cool drawer, because it's hosting a siddur.
